

Adults and students of all abilities (including beginners) are invited to join this community chorus, led by Kent Parry. No audition required.



Richard Alexander was 86 when he wrote this play, an intriguing study of religion and myth. Dick had a JD from the University of Chicago Law School, and was the senior partner of Alexander, Unikel, Bloom, Zalewa and Tennenbaum in Chicago, specializing in **Intellectual Property.** He was wounded in the Second World War, and received the Purple Heart. He was in a revolution in Argentina and was kidnapped in Pretoria, South Africa. He wrote this play while spending summers in Galena and

winters in Scottsdale, AZ.

Dick loved and embraced all religions and considered himself a "member" of many. His brilliant mind and refreshing wit are evident in this play, exploring the wonder and imperfections of Myths with sympathy, respect, "caution", and a great sense of humor. The cast includes Pat Terry, Mark Haman, Robert Armstrong, Jay Dickerson, Susan Barg, Suzy Kania and Joan Harmet.

Songwriters Showcase features Eric Lugosch Thursday, September 19, 7-9 pm



National Fingerpicking Champion Eric Lugosch will present a truly original and inspirational show for the September Showcase.

There are no gimmicks or gadgets--just a genuinely gifted imagination and a fluency that comes from years of working on his craft. Eric's arrangements of traditional songs and jazz standards are now considered classics in picking circles, where he is also regarded as one of America's best original fingerstyle composers, as well as a talented songwriter.

Eric has played and taught in festivals around the world, including the Wirral International Guitar Festival, the Ullapool Guitar Festival, International Guitar Meeting in Sarzana, Italy, and the New York Guitar Festival. He's had the honor of performing with greats such as Doc Watson, Taj Mahal, John Prine, and David Bromberg. Those who have heard Eric perform know they've been treated to someone special and memorable.

Authentic Bluegrass! September 26, 7 pm

The Rische Brothers (Scott and Mark) will join forces with Ron and Carolyn Wedekind for an Authentic Bluegrass Concert.

Scott Rische describes this Briar Patch Symphony as "the real deal," and will explain bluegrass, where it came from, as well as play lots of toe-tappin', foot stompin' music. We will hear Scott on mandolin, Mark on guitar, Ron on five-string banjo, and Carolyn on bass.



Scott Rische started playing guitar and mandolin in the early 60s and hasn't stopped! In the 70s he started performing professionally in bluegrass bands. Scott and his brother Mark played together for years with the Rische Brothers Band, which also included Scott's brother Forrest and Ron Wedekind. They played Bluegrass Festivals around the Midwest and frequently in the NW Chicago suburbs.

Ron Wedekind (aka "Weeds", aka "Galloping Ron") learned to play 5string banjo in the mid-60's and went on to play with numerous Bluegrass bands throughout the Midwest in establishments ranging from saloons on Chicago's north side to Rupp Arena in Lexington, KY. Carolyn joined him in a number of these groups.

Some of the bands were: Fox River Valley Boys; Weeds and Red-Grass; The Rische Brothers; and Bill Wells & the Blue Ridge Mountain Grass. In the 90s, Ron and Carolyn played with their family band, called Weeds and Sprouts, which included their three children. Today, Ron plays with Pickin' Up Speed, and Carolyn plays with the Anna Maria String Band.

This evening of music promises to be fun, lively, powerful, educational and energizing!



She and her husband, artist Paul Chase, have consistently helped with our annual "Paint It, Fix It, Clean It" weeks in January when we do cleaning and small remodeling projects. When help is needed, Mary is there.

It's not surprising that Mary is comfortable at the Center, surrounded by art. The stunning home she shares with Paul is full of his and others' art work, and the garden is a lovely setting for his sculptures. Though she denies being artistic herself, she is sensitive to and enjoys the visual arts. "Art makes me feel good. Paul creates it, and I buy it," she jokes.

Mary's own talent is

music. She has been singing since she was a child, when she was given both voice and piano lessons. Music and singing have always been part of her life, although her profession was down a different path: special education and social work. Then, after moving to Galena twenty years ago, she taught and was an administrator in the **Education Department** at Loras College; she also traveled widely as an education consultant.

Mary's other volunteer activities have included serving on the Board of Riverview Center and helping to serve meals at the First Congregational Church



in Dubuque. Luckily for us, she still finds time to help with many activities at the Center for the Arts. "It's a great organization!" she says-and there's no doubt that she, and others like her, are crucial to keeping it that way.
